2023-2026 CONTRIBUTION TO THE CENTER FOR DEMOGRAPHIC RESEARCH

GENERAL MANAGER'S RECOMMENDATION

RECOMMENDATION: Recommend to the Board of Directors to:

Approve and authorize the General Manager to execute a three-year Memorandum of Understanding with California State University Fullerton Auxiliary Services Corporation for the continued operation of the Center for Demographic Research for the period July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2026, for a total amount not to exceed \$207,872.

BACKGROUND

The Center for Demographic Research (CDR), located at California State University Fullerton, develops demographic and related information for Orange County. Since 1996, CDR has been supported by the Orange County Sanitation District (OC San) and other sponsoring agencies or contributing partners. OC San uses CDR information to develop wastewater flow projections, assess capacity needs for sewer conveyance and treatment facilities, and project revenues from connection fees.

RELEVANT STANDARDS

- Maintain and adhere to appropriate internal planning documents
- Sustain 1, 5, 20-year planning horizons
- Maintain collaborative and cooperative relationships with regulators, stakeholders, and neighboring communities

PROBLEM

OC San's sponsorship of the CDR will end on June 30, 2023. Without OC San's contribution to the CDR, the program will be impacted, and OC San specific products may no longer be prepared or be available for OC San's use. These CDR prepared products are used for various master planning efforts at OC San.

PROPOSED SOLUTION

Continue OC San's support of the CDR as a Contributing Partner by approving the 2023-2026 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).

TIMING CONCERNS

The CDR MOU must be executed by OC San's General Manager and returned to CDR by June 30, 2023.

RAMIFICATIONS OF NOT TAKING ACTION

OC San will no longer be a supporting member of the CDR, will not receive OC San specific population estimates and projections, and may not be eligible to receive other CDR generated reports and information. Similar information would need to be prepared via other means to continue OC San's standard processes.

PRIOR COMMITTEE/BOARD ACTIONS

April 2020 - Approved a three-year Memorandum of Understanding with California State University Fullerton Auxiliary Services Corporation for operation of the Center for Demographic Research for the period July 1, 2020 through June 30,2023, for a total amount not to exceed \$331,504.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

The CDR produces demographic based information such as the "Orange County Progress Report," "Orange County Projections" and census, and employment data by traffic analysis zone. CDR is funded by the California State University Fullerton and via local agencies that serve as Sponsors or Contributing Partners. Sponsors include the County of Orange, Orange County Council of Governments, Orange County Transportation Authority, Transportation Corridor Agencies, Southern California Association of Governments, Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC), and OCWD. Contributing Partners include the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission and OC San.

Over the course of the three-year MOU, the CDR will operate with a budget of \$3,376,414. California State University Fullerton shall contribute a total of \$614,090, each of the six sponsorships shall contribute \$405,742 (MWDOC and OCWD share a sponsorship) and Contributing Partners contributions are reflective of work elements to be performed.

As part of this MOU, OC San is transitioning from a Sponsor to a Contributing Partner. This change will reduce OC San's membership costs moving forward by half and ensure that OC San will still receive organization specific information on an annual basis. The 2023-2026 MOU establishes OC San Contributing Partner fees at \$65,433 for 2023-24, \$69,789 for 2024-25, and \$72,649 for 2025-26 - a total of \$207,872 over three years.

Overall CDR costs increases are due to state minimum wage changes, required health benefits coverage, additional staffing to cover 2024 base year employment survey, and salary increases based on a 2022 Compensation and Classification survey.

AGREEMENT NO.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING by and between ORANGE COUNTY INTERESTS

and

CSU FULLERTON AUXILIARY SERVICES CORPORATION for the

CONTINUED OPERATION OF THE CENTER FOR DEMOGRAPHIC RESEARCH AT CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into between the County of Orange, Transportation Corridor Agencies, Orange County Transportation Authority, Municipal Water District of Orange County, Orange County Water District, Orange County Council of Governments, Southern California Association of Governments ("SPONSORS"); the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission and Orange County Sanitation District ("CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS") and the CSU Fullerton Auxiliary Services Corporation, ("ASC"), which is a 501 (c)3 California corporation organized under California law as an auxiliary organization of California State University, Fullerton ("CSUF"). This MOU is for the development of demographic data and related support products. Obligations and rights specified for CSUF in the MOU shall be exercised by the ASC.

WHEREAS, the development of demographic and related information for Orange County is a vital data source used for a wide range of local, subregional and regional applications, including, transportation infrastructure planning, facilities planning and timing, development of fee programs, bond revenue stream analysis, general planning and other applications; and

WHEREAS, a number of primary users of data in Orange County have recognized the benefit of having a local area expertise in developing demographic projections and associated products; and

WHEREAS, these SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS, and CSUF agree on the importance of having a single entity in Orange County developing demographic products and providing such products to data users; and

WHEREAS, these agencies also desire to establish a long-term process which allows each individual agency participation in the development and review of demographic products; and

WHEREAS, the Center for Demographic Research ("CDR") located at CSUF provides an opportunity to place demographic activities in a setting that accomplishes SPONSORS' and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS' objectives and provides augmented educational opportunities for CSUF; and

WHEREAS, CSUF will be listed as a "SPONSOR" based upon their financial contribution as outlined in the budget in Attachment 1 and in-kind contributions for the balance of the remaining Sponsor seat; and

WHEREAS, the SPONSORS have worked cooperatively in supporting and organizing the Center for Demographic Research for 27 years and wish to continue their cooperation; and

WHEREAS, the CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS wish to participate in supporting the Center for Demographic Research beginning in Fiscal Year 2010/2011; and

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS RESOLVED that the SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS, and the ASC agree as follows:

1. The SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS will fund the CDR for the next three years for an annual total fee as set forth in Item IV below and Attachment 1.

2. Process and Structure

A. Orange County Projections

The Orange County Council of Governments ("OCCOG") will be responsible for the approval of the Orange County Projections at the Regional Statistical Area level and subsequent to that action the County of Orange will approve the Orange County Projections. The OCCOG will work with CDR staff to integrate the Orange County Projections as approved into the Southern California Association of Governments ("SCAG") Regional Growth Forecast. Sponsors will make good faith efforts to use the Orange County Projections data in all future forecasting and planning efforts.

B. Management Oversight

The Management Oversight Committee ("MOC") shall meet at least four (4) times each year to (1) consider policy matters associated with the operations of the Center for Demographic Research, (2) review products status and activities which are part of the core Work Program, (3) review the Center for Demographic Research's financial status and status of MOU signatures, (4) set CDR budget and modify staff salaries funded by this MOU (5) consider requests from additional agencies wishing to become sponsors or contributing partners, (6) modify budget and work program upon addition or termination of a sponsor or contributing partner, (7) address other matters vital to the function of the Center for Demographic Research, and (8) undertake additional tasks as requested by the SPONSORS.

The Management Oversight Committee will be comprised of staff representing the SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS and CSUF. Each SPONSOR will have one voting member of equal standing on the Management Oversight Committee including one member jointly representing the Municipal Water District of Orange County and the Orange County Water District; each CONTRIBUTING PARTNER will have one non-voting Ex-Officio member. The designees from each SPONSOR, CONTRIBUTING PARTNER, and the university shall be named by July 1 of each year. An organization may also designate an individual(s) to serve as an alternate

member of the Management Oversight Committee. The committee chair and vice-chair will be elected for a three-year term from voting members.

C. Technical Oversight:

The Technical Advisory Committee ("TAC") provides technical guidance and input into the development of each product produced under this MOU before they are reviewed by the Management Oversight Committee. The Technical Advisory Committee advises the Director of the Center for Demographic Research, as well as reports to the Management Oversight Committee. The Committee will include one voting representative from each SPONSOR including a member representing the Municipal Water District of Orange County and the Orange County Water District; each CONTRIBUTING PARTNER will have one non-voting Ex-Officio member. University participation on the Technical Advisory Committee will include at least one voting member from CSUF, and one voting member each from the University of California, Irvine and Chapman University. The Director of the Center for Demographic Research will coordinate with research centers at these universities to ensure data consistency. The designees from each SPONSOR, CONTRIBUTING PARTNER, and agency shall be named by July 1 of each year. The committee chair and vice-chair will be elected for a three-year term from voting members.

The Technical Advisory Committee shall schedule at least four (4) meetings each year. It will (1) provide a report to the Management Oversight Committee summarizing its meetings, (2) provide advice on the approach, techniques, data sources and methods used to develop new products, (3) facilitate the acquisition of data necessary to produce products, (4) provide suggestions on the interpretation and analysis incorporated into deliverables, (5) provide input on assumptions for the development of the growth projections, (6) provide review of deliverables prior to approval by the Management Oversight Committee and (7) undertake other tasks as identified by the Management Oversight Committee.

D. Transportation Modeling Data

The Orange County Transportation Authority ("OCTA") will be responsible for the approval of all transportation modeling variables used in the Orange County Transportation Analysis Model ("OCTAM") at the Traffic Analysis Zone level. The transportation modeling variables shall be consistent with the Orange County Projections, as approved by the Orange County Council of Governments and the County of Orange at the Regional Statistical Area Level. The OCTA and SCAG will exercise user agreements for their consultants to access the transportation modeling variables.

3. Duration and Terminations

This agreement will become effective upon execution and ends on June 30, 2026. A review of the performance of the Center for Demographic Research in meeting its obligations under this MOU will be conducted by the Management Oversight Committee throughout the term July 2023 through June 2026. This MOU may be extended and/or amended by mutual agreement of all signatories.

A party may terminate its participation under this MOU by giving each of the other parties sixty (60) days written notice thereof. Upon said notice of termination, the SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER terminating its participation shall pay the balance of fees owed by the SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER for that given fiscal year. Each fiscal year, the SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS shall review and approve in writing the MOU, work program, and funding arrangement. Such written approval shall constitute a SPONSOR'S or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER'S agreement to participate in this Agreement. In the event that ASC wishes to terminate its participation, it shall reimburse the SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS any advance payments, less an amount to cover expenses related to work in progress and less costs reasonably necessary to effect such termination. If a party wishes to withdraw from the agreement, said notice shall be affected by delivery of such notice in person or by depositing said notice in the United States mail, registered or certified mail, return receipt required, postage prepaid.

4. Funding and Schedule

Payments shall be made in accordance with invoicing policies of the ASC according to the schedule below. SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS will be invoiced at the beginning of each quarter. Quarterly payments equal to 25% of the annual fees shall follow invoices submitted according to the calendar below:

Fiscal Year 2023/2024: July 2023, October 2023, January 2024, April 2024 Fiscal Year 2024/2025: July 2024, October 2024, January 2025, April 2025 Fiscal Year 2025/2026: July 2025, October 2025, January 2026, April 2026

SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS shall pay one-quarter of their annual fees upon receipt of said invoices or may prepay for an entire fiscal year. Prepayment does not imply a discounted rate.

5. Administrative Representatives

- A. The Principal Investigator for the operations and management of the Center for Demographic Research and the conduct of this MOU is Deborah Diep, Director. The Assistant Director, Rubaiya Zaman, will serve as the Principal Investigator in the Director's absence. They are authorized to negotiate supplemental services with the SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS, and Non-sponsors as noted in Section VII. Sydney Dawes, Director, ASC Office of Sponsored Programs is designated as the administrative representative for the ASC. Should the Principal Investigators become unavailable for any reason, no other Principal Investigator shall be chosen by CSUF or the ASC without the approval of the SPONSORS. Furthermore, the ASC agrees that the Management Oversight Committee shall make the recommendation on the selection of the Director or interim Director of the Center for Demographic Research and no Director or interim Director shall be appointed without approval of the Management Oversight Committee. The Management Oversight Committee will serve as the search committee if a search committee for the Director is required by the ASC.
- B. Equipment and furniture purchased by ASC under the terms of this MOU shall remain the property of the SPONSORS. In the event that the Center for Demographic Research is disbanded, the equipment remains the property of the SPONSORS and the Management Oversight Committee shall determine its disposition.
- C. Databases and applications developed and maintained for the Center for Demographic Research purposes shall remain under control of the SPONSORS. In the event that Center for Demographic Research is relocated from CSUF, all Center for Demographic Research functions and designations shall accompany the Center for Demographic Research.

6. Additional Sponsorships and Revenues

Other agencies and entities can become sponsors or contributing partners of the Center for Demographic Research with unanimous agreement among the SPONSORS as determined by a vote of the Management Oversight Committee. Adjustments in sponsor fees found necessary resulting from the addition of sponsors shall be determined by the Management Oversight Committee with consultation from the Center for Demographic Research Principal Investigators.

The disposition of additional revenues generated through additional sponsors, and the sale of products and services to non-sponsors shall be determined by the Management Oversight Committee. The additional funds shall be prorated according to the respective sponsor fee. SPONSORS shall have the option of expending their share of the additional funds on CDR activities, products or equipment or having the funds returned to the SPONSORS at the end of the fiscal year.

7. Products and Deliverables

- A. The Center for Demographic Research will produce the identified core Demographic Products and Services as described in Attachment 2 and listed in Attachment 3. Each SPONSOR will receive ten (10) copies in printed form and one (1) copy of estimates and projections in electronic form.
- B. The SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS have the right to request supplemental products and support services from the Center for Demographic Research through a purchase order. Projects above the amount of \$35,000 shall be approved by the ASC. Such purchases may be entered into if the SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER agrees to pay ASC all additional costs resulting from the additional products or services, including an indirect cost of 22%, and if the activities do not interfere with the normal functioning of the CDR. If requests for additional products or services require interference with the normal functioning of the CDR as determined by the Management Oversight Committee or additional resources from the CDR's basic budget the proposal for such products and services will be forwarded to the Management Oversight Committee for their advice and consent prior to finalization of the agreement. In all cases, supplemental work for SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS shall be assessed indirect costs of 22%.
- C. Non-sponsors can contract with the Center for Demographic Research through the ASC for its services or obtain supplemental products and support services from the Center for Demographic Research through a Non-sponsor purchase order. A list of these projects will be submitted to the MOC on a quarterly basis. If the Director assesses a proposed project contains a conflict of interest, conflict of time commitment, or interference with the normal functioning of CDR, the Management Oversight Committee will be informed of the request for services and will review it for any potential conflicts. The Director shall notify the Management Oversight Committee of any such proposed agreement and provide the committee with draft text and budget, before the intended start of work. The Management Oversight Committee shall review the proposed project for possible conflicts of interests, conflicts of time commitment, and budgetary adequacy. The Management Oversight Committee may at its discretion impose a surcharge of funds to be used at its discretion. Action on these matters may be taken only with the concurrence of a majority of the members of the Management Oversight Committee and all such supplemental work for Non-sponsors shall be assessed normal indirect costs of 35.5% unless negotiated otherwise.

- D. Use of revenues generated by the sale of products produced by the Center for Demographic Research shall be determined by the Management Oversight Committee. A quarterly report on product sales will be presented to the Management Oversight Committee.
- E. Additional projects should not adversely affect the schedule of deliverables unless otherwise agreed to by the Management Oversight Committee.

8. Sponsorship

This Agreement shall be signed by all SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS by June 30, 2023 with the exception of the Southern California Association of Governments. The Southern California Association of Governments shall sign this Agreement by September 30, 2023. If all SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS listed in Section XVIII do not sign by September 30, 2023, the work program and budget will be modified to reflect the committed funding. If any SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER does not sign this Agreement, the funding amounts of the remaining SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS will not change. The remaining SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS are not required to make up the difference in the reduced budget. Any SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER listed as an ORANGE COUNTY INTEREST that does not sign this Agreement forfeits all rights, services, and privileges as a CDR SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER unless otherwise negotiated. A formal status report on execution will be delivered at each Management Oversight Committee meeting until all SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS sign this Agreement.

9. Liability and Insurance

Each party to this MOU hereby assumes any and all risks for personal injury and property damage attributable to the negligent acts or omissions of that party and the officers, employees, and agents thereof. ASC warrants that it has adequate Worker's Compensation Insurance and liability insurance for its own employees. The ASC, the SPONSORS (the County of Orange, Transportation Corridor Agencies, Orange County Transportation Authority, Municipal Water District of Orange County, Orange County Water District, Orange County Council of Governments, and Southern California Association of Governments), and the CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS (the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission and Orange County Sanitation District) agree to indemnify and hold each other, their respective officers, employees, students, agents, harmless from and against all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees), or claims for injury of damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorney's fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the indemnifying party, its officers, employees, students or agents.

10. Independent Contractor

In the performance of all services and obligations under this agreement, SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS, and ASC shall act as independent contractors. None shall be considered an employee or agent of the other.

11. Use of Names

SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS agree not to use the names of the ASC or CSUF in any commercial connection with work performed under this Agreement without prior written permission from the ASC. SPONSORS and CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS may use said names in ordinary internal business reports concerning this Agreement and may use the names of the Center for Demographic Research and the Principal Investigators in non-commercial publicity announcing the results of the project.

ASC agrees not to use the names of SPONSORS and/or CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS in any commercial connection with this work without prior written permission from SPONSORS and/or CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS. ASC may use SPONSORS' and/or CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS' name in ordinary internal business reports concerning this agreement and in non-commercial publicity announcing the awarding of the contract.

The provisions of this Section of the Agreement shall survive for two (2) years beyond any termination date specified in Section III or any extension thereof.

12. Force Majeure

SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS, and ASC shall not be liable or deemed to be in default for any delay or failure in performance under this Agreement or interruption of services resulting, directly or indirectly, from acts of God, civil or military authority, acts of public enemy, strikes, labor disputes, or any similar cause beyond the reasonable control of SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS, or ASC, provided the affected party notifies the other party of the delay in writing within ten days of the onset of the delay.

13. Assignment

This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon and enforceable by the parties and their successors and permitted assigns. However, neither party may assign any of its rights or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other.

14. Modification and Waiver

None of the terms of the Agreement may be waived or modified except by an express agreement in writing signed by SPONSORS, CONTRIBUTING PARTNERS, and ASC. Modifications not documented in writing cannot be enforced. The failure or delay of

either party in enforcing any of its rights under this Agreement shall not be deemed a continuing waiver or a modification by such party of such right.

15. Governing Law

The validity and interpretation of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California.

16. Federal Statutes Relating to Nondiscrimination

ASC will comply with all Federal statutes relating to nondiscrimination. These include but are not limited to (a) Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (P.L. 88-352) which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color or national origin; (b) Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended (20 U.S. C. sections 1681-1683, and 1685-1686), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex; (c) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended (29 U.S. C. section 794), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicaps; (d) Age discrimination Act of 1975, as amended (42 U.S.C. sections 6101-6107), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age; (e) the Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972 (P.L. 92-255), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of drug abuse; (f) the Comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention, Treatment, and Rehabilitation Act of 1970 (P.O. 91-616), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of alcohol abuse or alcoholism; (g) sections 523 and 527 of the Public Health Service Act of 1912 (42 U.S.C. 290 dd-d and 290 ee-3), as amended, relating to confidentiality of alcohol and drug abuse patient records; (h) Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (42 U.S.C. section 3601 et seq.), as amended, relating to nondiscrimination in the sale, rental or financing of housing; (I) any other nondiscrimination provisions in the specific statute(s) under which application for Federal assistance is being made; and (j) the requirement of any other federal nondiscrimination statue(s) which may apply to the application.

17. Execution of MOU

This MOU, or any amendment related thereto, may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which shall constitute one and the same agreement. The signature page of this MOU or any amendment may be executed by way of a manual or authorized digital signature. Delivery of an executed counterpart of a signature page to this MOU or an amendment by electronic transmission scanned pages shall be deemed effective as a delivery of a manually or digitally executed counterpart to this MOU or any amendment.

18. Special Terms and Conditions

REPORTS

Orange County Progress Report

Produce an annual Orange County Progress Report. This document presents a unified and a comprehensive picture of Orange County and its 34 cities including its economic health, its demographic status and trends, and other information of interest to those who might wish to relocate to Orange County, do business in the County, or otherwise have an interest in the economic and demographic status and future of Orange County.

Orange County Projections

Preparation and development of OCP-2026 will begin during this three-year MOU with completion and adoption expected in late 2026. OCP-2026 will include continued development of Tier 3/city TAZ level for three cities (Anaheim, Irvine, and Newport Beach) that volunteered to participate in the OCP-2022 pilot Tier 3 program. This data will also be provided to SCAG for use in their modeling efforts at the Tier 3 level. The OCP dataset contains population, housing, and employment projections by 2020 census tract, jurisdiction, Community Analysis Area, and Regional Statistical Area for a 25-year period. This iteration will include agency boundaries for MWDOC & OCWD.

Orange County Facts and Figures

Update quarterly the Orange County Facts and Figures. This document focuses on the most frequently asked questions about Orange County demographics and related information.

Boundary and Annexation Report

Working with information provided by OC LAFCO, CDR staff will produce an annual report of the jurisdictional boundary changes. This multi-page report will contain a map of the year to year boundary changes and a table listing the area change and specific annexations and incorporations for each calendar year. Detailed annexation and vicinity maps from OC LAFCO's approved changes of organization documents will also be included in the report. For ease of reference and to make the information publicly available, the report will be posted on OC LAFCO's website.

Housing Activity Report

Using information from the Housing Inventory System (HIS), CDR staff will produce an annual report on the housing construction and demolition activity by jurisdiction. Information will be released in aggregate form at the jurisdiction level in a PDF.

PUBLIC INFORMATION SERVICES

Provide Public Information on Orange County Demographics as Requested

Provide information in response to numerous requests made by government agencies, elected officials, private companies, non-profit organizations, schools, students, and citizens regarding demographic and related information about Orange County.

Maintain CDR Website

Update the information currently on the CDR website on a regular basis and expand as information becomes available. CDR will continue to host the Orange County Data Acquisition Partnership (OCDAP) website as a subsite to CDR's website.

Provide Information and Analysis to News Media

Provide information, description, interviews, and analysis of demographics to news media to assist them in doing stories where demographics is the focus.

Update RHNA Allocations

Develop allocations of 2020 RHNA for annexations and incorporations as requested. Provide data support to local jurisdictions and SCAG during development of the 2020 RHNA. Monitor RHNA development process to ensure Orange County data is incorporated.

Process Decennial Census and American Community Survey Data

Process Bureau of Census data as it pertains to development of the Orange County Projections and at the request of CDR Sponsors.

State Data Center Affiliate

The CDR will serve as a State Data Center Affiliate to the Demographic Research Unit of the California Department of Finance. As an Affiliate, CDR will assist the SDC and Orange County in disseminating census data and improving public access to census data products consistent with services CDR already provides.

DATA BASES

Housing Inventory System

The Housing Inventory System (HIS) is a data system that includes all changes to each jurisdiction's housing stock, including recent changes to accessory dwelling units. Data is collected at the address level and converted into a GIS database by geocoding. After geocoding, quality analysis efforts include tying activity to parcels and building footprints. Depending on the jurisdiction, different documents are used to record added units including certificates of use and occupancy, utility release log, or building final documents. Demolitions and conversions are recorded though other recordation. Changes to the mobile home inventory will be verified with HCD data. This project includes an annual review and sign off process by each jurisdiction of their geocoded data to ensure accuracy.

Census Data by Partial TAZ

Update the correspondence tables of 2020 Census blocks to the TAZs after release of Census Bureau data and GIS shapefiles. As the various census files become available, transportation modeling variables and other key variables useful for projecting the modeling variables will be aggregated to TAZ.

Calibrate Age Cohort Component, Shift-Share and Headship Rate Models

Based on data from the Census Bureau, DOF, and EDD data, calibrate the models used to project county-wide population, housing and employment.

Master Polygon File

Update master polygon file based on the 2020 Census block file for use in development of OCP dataset and annual population and housing unit estimates. Allocate Census block data to TAZ, CAA, RSA, MWDOC and OCWD. Working with information from OC LAFCO, the master polygon file will be updated annually to include changes to agency boundaries: jurisdiction, MWDOC and OCWD.

Population and Housing Estimates by TAZ (OCP)

Estimates of population and housing by unit type will be developed using the 2010 Census and American Community Survey data at the split TAZ. From 2014 onwards, housing unit changes will be geocoded and aggregated to the TAZ. Annual estimates of population and housing will be produced by TAZ for maintenance of the OCP base file.

Annual Population and Housing Estimates by Partial Census Tract and Sponsor Agency

Estimates of population and housing units developed using the 2020 Census for each of the special district sponsors will be updated annually. From 2014 onwards, annual estimates (January 1) of population and housing will be produced by partial census tract and for each of the special district sponsor agencies: MWDOC and OCWD.

Project Total County Population, Housing, and Employment

Draft assumptions for OCP-2026 will be developed and reviewed by the CDR TAC. These will then be incorporated into the macro level models used to project population, housing, and employment. The resulting projections will be reviewed by the CDR TAC and MOC and then brought to the OCCOG TAC and Board for approval as the controls totals for OCP-2026.

Projected Population, Housing and Employment by TAZ (OCP)

Preparation and development of OCP-2026 will begin during this MOU cycle. Countywide population, housing, and employment for years 2020 through 2050 will be allocated to Traffic Analysis Zones split by jurisdictions. Following the allocation, extensive review and refinement will occur to assure the accuracy of the projections.

Secondary Variables by TAZ (OCTAM)

Preparation of the base year OCTAM data for OCP-2026 will begin in this MOU cycle. The basic projected population, housing, and employment from OCP-2026 will be expanded to the 14 OCTAM variables. These variables will include resident population, group quarters population, employed residents, median income, occupied single family dwelling units, occupied multiple family dwelling units, household size, retail employment, service employment, K-12 public school employment, all other employment, school enrollment, university enrollment, and area.

Entitlement Dataset & Support Services

Provide support to Orange County jurisdictions in the development of the entitlements database and other data requested by SCAG during the development of the 2024 and 2028 RTP/SCS. Monitor development process to ensure Orange County data is incorporated.

Consolidated Boundary and Annexation Program (CBAS)

CDR staff will report annual jurisdictional boundary and feature changes through the voluntary program of the U.S. Census Bureau that allows for a consolidated annual review of jurisdiction boundaries. This review will be done using the official County Surveyor/OC LAFCO jurisdiction GIS boundary file. Orange County jurisdictions will be able to opt in or out of this CDR service annually. CDR will notify each participating jurisdiction and OC LAFCO of the outcome of the BAS review, i.e., whether there were any areas where jurisdiction boundaries needed to be corrected.

COMMITTEES

Participate in Sponsor Technical Advisory Committees as Requested

Participate in appropriate Sponsor technical advisory committees, such as OCCOG TAC, County's Demographic Steering Committee, OCTA's Modeling TAC, Orange County Data Acquisition Partnership Steering and Technical Advisory Committee, and SCAG's Technical Working Group and other regional working groups.

Coordinate with SCAG and SCAG Committees

This service revolves around the incorporation of OCP into the SCAG growth forecast. This service includes participation in SCAG expert panels and workshops to develop assumptions for their population and employment projections; monitoring the discussions relevant to the development of SCAG's growth forecast at SCAG policy committees and subregional coordinator meetings; and coordinating with relevant SCAG staff on this issue.

Coordinate with University Research Centers

CDR staff will coordinate with UCI and Chapman University research centers to ensure consistency between the CDR's forecast and estimates and those produced by these institutes.

2023-2026 CONTRIBUTING PARTNER LAFCO FUNDED PROJECT: Sphere of Influence Estimates

CDR will update its master polygon file on an annual basis with changes to the county islands and sphere of influence (SOI) boundaries. CDR will produce annual estimate of January 1 population, housing, and acreage for each of the county islands, 2020 Census Designated Places (CDPs) and SOI polygons upon completion of the annual Housing Inventory System to maintain this information in preparation for OC LAFCO's municipal service reviews. This effort includes updates covering the period from current January 1 back to the most recent Decennial Census using population control totals from the State Department of Finance.

Boundary and Annexation Report: Working with OC LAFCO over the three-year MOU cycle, CDR will attempt to build a historical reference collection of these reports going back to 2000 as information is available.

NEW PROJECTS & SERVICES

Building Footprints

Using the building footprint geodatabase deliverable accessed through OCDAP, for CDR's internal use, CDR will work to append and expand the building footprint attributes in Orange County by general use type, e.g., residential (with ADUs; using CDR's HIS address-level housing activity geodatabase), employment, schools, and accessory structures like carports.

2023-2026 LAFCO FUNDED PROJECT: Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities (DUCs)

On an annual basis after the ACS 5-year block group data is released, CDR will calculate and identify the Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities (DUCs) within Orange County based on LAFCO's definition. Each year, CDR will provide LAFCO with a shapefile of the DUCs in Orange County and a shapefile of the DUC portions within the unincorporated portions of Orange County. The first regular annual deliverable will be January 2024. The initial deliverable will include DUC shapefiles for latest ACS data available as of July 2023 for delivery in August 2023.

2023-2026 CONTRIBUTING PARTNER OC SAN FUNDED PROJECT: Population Estimates

CDR will update its master polygon file on an annual basis with changes to the OC San boundaries. CDR will produce annual estimate of January 1 population upon completion of the annual Housing Inventory System. This effort includes updates covering the period from current January 1 back to the most recent Decennial Census using population control totals from the State Department of Finance.

Attachment 4: Special Terms and Conditions

1. Invoicing for Payment

Prompt Payment to Subconsultants, if applicable: ASC or Subconsultant shall pay any subtier consultant for satisfactorily completed work no later than ten (10) days of receipt of each payment from SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER unless a longer period is agreed to in writing. Any delay or postponement of payment over thirty (30) calendar days may take place only for good cause and with SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER's prior written approval. This requirement shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies otherwise available to the ASC or Subconsultant in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by the ASC, deficient subconsultant performance, and/or noncompliance by a subconsultant. This clause applies to both Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) and non-DBE subconsultants.

2. Written and Electronic Versions of Work Products and Related Work Materials

All work products produced under the Agreement shall contain the following disclaimer:

"The preparation of this report has been financed in part through grant(s) from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) through the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT). The contents of this report reflect the views of the author who is responsible for the facts and accuracy of the data presented herein. The contents do not necessarily reflect the official views or policies of CDR Sponsors, Contributing Partners, or DOT. This report does not constitute a standard, specification or regulation."

3. Compliance with Laws, Rules, and Regulations

ASC shall perform all services under the Agreement in accordance and in full compliance with all applicable Federal, State and local statutes, rules, regulations, and policies and procedures and shall secure and maintain all licenses or permits required by law.

4. Contingency Fees or other Unlawful Consideration

- a. ASC certifies, by execution of this MOU, except bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by ASC for the purpose of securing business, no person or external agency has been employed or retained by ASC to solicit or secure the Agreement for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingency fee for breach or violation of this warranty, SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER has the right in its sole discretion to terminate its partnership from the Agreement with its only obligation to pay for the value of the work actually performed, or to deduct from the Agreement price, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingency fee.
- b. ASC further certifies that the Agreement was not obtained or secured through rebates,

kickbacks or other unlawful consideration either promised or paid to any SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER employee. For breach or violation of this warranty, SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER shall have the right, in its discretion, to terminate its partnership from the Agreement without liability, to pay only for the value of work performed, or to deduct from the Agreement price or otherwise recover the full amount of each rebate, kickback or other unlawful consideration.

5. Records Retention and Audits

- a. ASC and its Subconsultant(s), if applicable, shall maintain all source documents, books, and records connected with their performance of the Agreement for a minimum of three (3) years from the date that SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER makes final payment to ASC or until audit resolution is achieved for each annual OWP Agreement (between SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER and Caltrans), whichever is later, and all other related, pending matters are closed.
- b. ASC shall establish and maintain, an accounting system conforming to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) to support invoices which segregate and accumulate the costs of the applicable Project Number(s) by line item and produce Quarterly Reports which clearly identify reimbursable costs and other expenditures related to such Project Number(s).
- c. Upon request, at any time during normal business hours and as often as SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER, The State Controller, County Auditors (in SCAG region), or other government agencies or any duly authorized representative may deem necessary, ASC shall make available for examination all of its records with respect to all matters covered by the Agreement for purposes of audit, examination, or to make copies or transcripts of such records, including, but not limited to, contracts, invoices, payrolls, personnel records, conditions of employment and other records relating to all matters covered by the Agreement. Such records and access to the facilities and premises of ASC shall be made available during the period of performance of the Agreement, and for a minimum of four (4) years following the close of SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER's Fiscal Year.
- d. ASC agrees and shall require that all of its agreements with Subconsultant(s), if applicable, contain provisions requiring adherence to this section in its entirety.

6. Federal and State Lobbying Activities Certification

a. ASC certifies, to the best of its knowledge and belief, that no State or Federal funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any State or Federal agency, a Member of the State Legislature or United States Congress, an officer or employee of the Legislature or Congress, or any employee of a Member of the

Legislature or Congress in connection with the awarding of any State or Federal contract, the making of any State or Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, or the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any State or Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.

- b. If any funds other than State or Federal funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any Federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, ASC shall complete and submit Federal Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with those form instructions.
- c. This certification is a material representation of fact, upon which reliance was placed when the Agreement was entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into the Agreement pursuant to 31 U.S.C. 1352.
- d. ASC also agrees that it will require that the language of this certification be included in all agreements with subconsultants which are funded wholly or in part by any funds provided herein and which exceed \$100,000 and that all such Subconsultants, if applicable, shall certify and disclose accordingly.

7. Certifications and Assurances

- a. ASC shall adhere to the requirements contained in SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER's annual Certification and Assurances (FHWA and FTA "Metropolitan Transportation Planning Process Certification") submitted as part of SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER's OWP, pursuant to 23 CFR 450.334 and 23 U.S.C. 134. This Certification shall be published annually in SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER's OWP. ASC shall additionally comply with the requirements contained in the annual FTA "Certifications and Assurances for FTA Assistance," including "Certifications and Assurances Required of Each Applicant" and the "Lobbying Certification" in compliance with 49 U.S.C. Chapter 53; published annually in SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER's OWP. Such assurances shall apply to ASC to the same extent as SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER, and include but are not limited to the following areas:
 - (1) Standard Assurances
 - (2) Debarment, Suspension, and Other Responsibility Matters for Primary Covered

Transactions

- (3) Drug Free Work Place Agreement
- (4) Intergovernmental Review Assurance
- (5) Nondiscrimination Assurance

- c. ASC shall require its Subconsultant(s), if applicable, to comply with these Certifications, and agrees to furnish documentation at no cost to SPONSOR or CONTRIBUTING PARTNER to support this requirement that all of its agreements with Subconsultant(s) contain provisions requiring adherence to this section in its entirety.

8. Cost Principles

- a. ASC agrees to comply with the following:

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1216, as amended, Muratsuchi. Wastewater treatment plants: monitoring of emissions. air pollutants.

Existing law generally designates air pollution control and air quality management districts with the primary responsibility for the control of air pollution from all sources other than vehicular sources. Existing law authorizes the State Air Resources Board or the air district to adopt rules and regulations to require the owner or the operator of an air pollution emission source to take any action that the state board or the air district determines to be reasonable for the determination of the amount of air pollution emissions from that source. Existing law requires the air pollution control officer to inspect, as the officer determines necessary, the monitoring devices installed in every stationary source of air contaminants located within a jurisdiction that is required to have those devices to ensure that the devices are functioning properly. Existing law authorizes the district to require reasonable fees to be paid by the operator of that source to cover the expense of the inspection and other costs related thereto. A person who violates these requirements, or any rule, regulation, permit, or order of the state board or of a district adopted pursuant to these requirements is guilty of a

misdemeanor and subject to a specified fine or imprisonment, or both a fine and imprisonment, as provided.

This bill would require, on or before January 1, 2025, the owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility that is located within 1,500 feet of a residential area and meets other, specified criteria to develop, install, operate, and maintain a fence-line monitoring system in accordance with guidance developed by the appropriate air quality management district. The bill would require the fence-line monitoring system to include equipment capable of measuring pollutants of concern, including hydrogen sulfide, nitrogen oxides, and volatile organic compounds emitted to the atmosphere from wastewater treatment or reclamation processes that the appropriate district deems appropriate for monitoring. The bill would also require the owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility to collect real-time data from the wastewater treatment-related fence-line monitoring system, to maintain records of that data, and to transmit the data to the appropriate air *quality management district in accordance with the district's guidance.* In addition, the bill would require, to the extent feasible, the data generated by these systems to be provided to the public as quickly as possible in a publicly accessible format.

By adding to the duties of air districts and by expanding the scope of crimes, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for specified reasons.

The California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006 designates the State Air Resources Board as the state agency charged with monitoring and regulating sources of emissions of greenhouse gases. Existing law requires the State Water Resources Control Board to elassify types of wastewater treatment plants, as defined, for the purpose of determining the levels of competence necessary to operate them.

This bill would state the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation that would relate to improving the monitoring of emissions from wastewater treatment plants.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 42705.7 is added to the Health and Safety Code, to read:

- 42705.7. (a) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:
- (1) "Wastewater treatment facility" means a wastewater treatment or reclamation facility that comes within both of the following descriptions:
 - (A) Is located within 1,500 feet of a residential neighborhood.
- (B) Has a 450-million-gallon-per-day design capacity and processes an average of 25 million gallons or more of inflow per day.
- (2) "Wastewater treatment-related fence-line monitoring system" means equipment that measures and records air pollutant concentrations at or adjacent to a wastewater treatment facility and that may be useful for detecting or estimating emissions of pollutants from the treatment facility, including the quantity of fugitive emissions and other air emissions, and meets the minimum requirements of the appropriate air quality management district.
- (b) On or before January 1, 2025, the owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility shall develop, install, operate, and maintain a fence-line monitoring system in accordance with guidance developed by the appropriate air quality management district. The fence-line monitoring system shall include equipment capable of measuring pollutants of concern, including hydrogen sulfide, nitrogen oxides, and volatile organic compounds emitted to the atmosphere from wastewater treatment or reclamation processes that the appropriate district deems appropriate for monitoring.
- (c) The owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility shall collect real-time data from the wastewater treatment-related fence-line monitoring system, shall maintain records of that data, and shall transmit the data to the appropriate air quality management district in accordance with the district's guidance. To the extent feasible, the data generated by these systems shall be provided to the public as quickly as possible in a publicly accessible format.

(d) Guidance developed by a district pursuant to this section shall take into account technological capabilities and incorporate input from affected parties.

- (e) The owner or operator of a wastewater treatment facility shall be responsible for the costs associated with implementation, maintenance, and operation of a fence-line monitoring system pursuant to this section.
- SEC. 2. No reimbursement is required by this act pursuant to Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution because a local agency or school district has the authority to levy service charges, fees, or assessments sufficient to pay for the program or level of service mandated by this act or because costs that may be incurred by a local agency or school district will be incurred because this act creates a new crime or infraction, eliminates a crime or infraction, or changes the penalty for a crime or infraction, within the meaning of Section 17556 of the Government Code, or changes the definition of a crime within the meaning of Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution.

SECTION 1. It is the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation that would relate to improving the monitoring of emissions from wastewater treatment plants.

GENERAL MANAGER'S RECOMMENDATION

Receive and file the Legislative Affairs Update for the month of April 2023.

BACKGROUND

The Orange County Sanitation District's (OC San) legislative affairs program includes advocating for OC San's legislative interests; sponsoring legislation (where appropriate); and seeking Local, State, and Federal funding for projects and programs.

RELEVANT STANDARDS

- Maintain influential legislative advocacy and a public outreach program
- Build brand, trust, and support with policy makers and community leaders
- Maintain collaborative and cooperative relationships with regulators, stakeholders, and neighboring communities

PROBLEM

Without a strong advocacy program, elected officials may not be aware of OC San's mission, programs, and projects and how they could be impacted by proposed legislation.

PROPOSED SOLUTION

Continue to work with Local, State, and Federal officials to advocate for OC San's legislative interests. Help to create/monitor legislation and grants that would benefit OC San, the wastewater industry, and the community. To assist in relationship building efforts, OC San will continue to reach out to elected officials providing facility tours, one-on-one meetings, and trips to Washington D.C. and Sacramento.

RAMIFICATIONS OF NOT TAKING ACTION

If OC San does not work with Local, State, and Federal elected officials, legislation could be passed that negatively affects OC San and the wastewater industry. Additionally, a lack of engagement may result in missed funding opportunities.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Federal Update:

On April 24, Congressman Correa visited Plant No. 1 to present OC San with a check for \$3.45 million for the Supercritical Water Oxidation (SCWO) Project. During this event, a roundtable was held where OC San Board of Directors, staff, and the Congressman were able to discuss the project and how the funding will be used. OC Staff provided a tour of the SCWO project site and discussed the benefits of the pilot project and where OC San sees the project going forward.

State Update:

The month of May will serve as a time that the Governor presents his "May Revision" of the January budget proposal, followed by the constitutional deadline of July 1 where the Governor must sign a budget bill into law. Since the bill introduction on February 17, the Legislature produced 1,751 Assembly Bills and 881 Senate Bills, for a total of 2,632 bills. Of those bills introduced, there were 495 spot bills and 551 intent bills between the two houses, for a total of 1,046 placeholder measures. That means 40 percent of the introduced bills were placeholder measures in need of substantive language amendments.

Washington Update

Congress returned from an extended recess to continue its efforts to develop a fiscal year 2024 budget and most importantly an increase in the debt ceiling. In addition to the budget and spending debate, efforts to overturn the Waters of the United States (WOTUS) rule that became effective in March were dispensed with as the House and Senate could not overturn the president's veto of the congressional resolution to nullify the rule. The following summarizes the status of issues of interest to OC San.

• PFAS Rulemaking and Legislation Continue to Take Shape

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (US EPA, agency) Office of Water continues to move forward with its aggressive agenda to finalize designation of Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) chemicals as hazardous substances under Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA). Following its proposed rule to designate PFOS and PFOA, the agency on April 12 issued an Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to designate an additional seven members of the PFAS family, including GEN X. The agency provided for a swift thirty-day public comment period. After the closing of the period (May 13), the agency is expected to review comments and quickly issue a final rule. This will effectively expand the universe of PFAS chemicals subject to CERCLA cleanups and liability impacts.

The agency action only heightens the need for legislative action to provide an exemption from CERCLA liability. The anticipated draft Senate legislation has not been released as the Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works staff have been unable to reach a bipartisan agreement on the parameters of any bill. While we anticipate a draft to be released, it is unclear when this will happen. The committee staff understand the water sector's (and others) needs for a passive receiver exemption from CERCLA liability.

Adding to the debate over the need for an exemption is USEPA's assurances that it will rely upon its discretionary authority. Validating OC San's concerns about liability exposure under CERCLA, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce recently challenged the agency's legal authority not to enforce against specific sectors, like wastewater agencies. The Chamber argued in a letter to USEPA and the Department of Justice that any such policy would be subject to legal challenges.

PFAS CERCLA Liability Exemption Legislation

Congressional efforts to address wastewater agencies' potential PFAS liability under CERCLA because of USEPA's decision to list PFAS as hazardous under CERCLA continue to take shape. Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works member Cynthia Lummis (R-WY) is expected to introduce legislation providing for an explicit exemption from CERCLA liability for the water sector. The bill as drafted adopts the language that OC San had advocated for over the past year. Notably, the bill will address biosolids to ensure that the continued beneficial uses of biosolids remain available. As of this writing, any action on the legislation is unlikely until later this summer when the Senate committee might consider a broader bill in support of funding for PFAS destruction technologies.

House Committee on Natural Resources Conducts California Water Hearing
The House Committee on Natural Resources (committee) held a field hearing
into Representative David Valadao's (R-CA) WATER for CA Act (H.R. 215) where
Central Valley water interests testified on the importance of legislating long term
solutions to assure reliable water supplies. Noting the fact that the past winter's
storms provided a respite from the urgency of the drought, the witnesses
emphasize that water supplies will continue to be threatened. The hearing
illustrated that a consensus exists to move a bill forward. However, the
parameters of any bill remain to be finalized due to voiced concerns over

State Legislative Updates

The month of April saw the State Legislature's quick pace of considering and amending legislation to ensure bills progressed through their first house. April featured the legislative deadline for policy committees to hear and report to fiscal committees fiscal bills introduced in their house. Measures deemed to have a fiscal impact that did not meet this deadline have failed to progress and will become 2-year bills. Below is an overview of pertinent state actions from the month of April.

State Legislature

With the deadline for measures with a fiscal impact to receive policy committee consideration by April 28, the month of April featured policy committees with packed agendas. The deadline marks an important milestone for bills, given that policy committees are responsible for the consideration of a bill's policy implications. During the policy committee process, bills are amended and refined pursuant to committee member and stakeholder input. If they are deemed to have a fiscal impact, upon passage in their respective policy committees, they move over to the applicable Appropriations Committee, which gauges impacts on the State's financial ability to support proposed programs. The shift from policy considerations to fiscal considerations aligns with the State's budget process, which will kick into high gear in May, with the release of the May Revision. The revision will offer an assessment of the State's overall fiscal condition and ability to accommodate additional spending programs contained within various bills.

Notable outcomes from April's policy committee deadline for fiscal bills include the following, organized by issue area:

Water and Sanitation

- AB 234 (Bauer-Kahan) would prohibit a synthetic polymer microparticle from being placed on the market in this state as a substance on its own or, where the synthetic polymer microparticles are present to confer a sought-after characteristic, in mixtures in a concentration equal to or greater than 0.01% by weight.
 - This bill was pulled from the Committee by the author and is now a two-year bill. The bill will be amended and brought back next year.
- AB 246 (Papan) would prohibit any person from manufacturing, distributing, selling, or
 offering for sale in the state any menstrual products that contain regulated PFAS.
 This bill passed the Assembly Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee

 AB 727 (Weber) would prohibit a person from manufacturing, selling, delivering, distributing, holding, or offering for sale in the state a cleaning product that contains regulated PFAS.

This bill passed the Assembly Environmental Safety and Toxic Materials Committee.

• <u>SB 23</u> (Caballero) requires various State Agencies to take final action on water quality certifications issued under the federal Clean Water Act and issue permits in specific timeframes for water supply and flood risk reduction projects.

This bill passed the Senate Environmental Quality Committee.

Brown Act Reform/Open Meetings

- AB 557 (Hart) eliminates the sunset date on provisions of law allowing local agencies to
 use teleconferencing without complying with specified Ralph. M Brown Act (Brown Act)
 requirements during a proclaimed state of emergency.
 This measure passed the Assembly Local Government Committee unanimously.
- AB 817 (Pacheco) allows a subsidiary body of a local government to use teleconferencing, with certain requirements.
 This bill's hearing was postponed at the request of the author, likely in order to take substantive amendments before its hearing.
- AB 1379 (Papan) revises teleconferencing provisions included in AB 2449 (Rubio, statutes of 2022) by removing restrictions on the frequency of teleconferencing and its geographical barriers for participating in meetings remotely.
 This measure was held by the Author due to disagreements on the scope of the policy with the Assembly Local Government Committee Chair. It could be reconsidered next year.

Governance and Transparency

AB 1637 (Irwin) requires local governments to switch to a .gov domain. The measure took amendments to push out the timeline for compliance from 2025 to 2026.
 This measure passed the Consumer Protection and Privacy Committee and will move to the Appropriations Committee for Consideration.

Air Resources Board Approves Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation

On April 28, the California Air Resources Board (ARB) unanimously voted to approve the controversial Advanced Clean Fleets regulation banning the sale of new diesel big rigs, delivery and garbage trucks by 2036 and requiring large fleets to reach 100 percent zero-emissions by 2042 or sooner, depending on the vehicle type. This regulation also applies to all State and local government fleets, including city, county, special district, and State agency fleets. According to ARB, the goal of this effort is to accelerate the number of medium and heavy-duty zero-emission vehicle purchases to achieve a full transition to zero-emission vehicles in California as soon as possible.

Some freight transportation companies and local government officials call the deadlines in the rule unachievable. They say the new technology still has major drawbacks, including the high cost of electric trucks and their low battery range. The State also has not yet developed a charging network to support electric trucks, and existing chargers can take hours in some cases.

California has more than 80,000 electric vehicle chargers deployed across the State. An additional 17,000 are set to be installed, however, the State will need approximately 1.2 million chargers to support the 7.5 million electric vehicles expected on the roads by 2030. In addition, numerous stakeholders have significant doubt about the ability to generate enough electricity to meet demand. The State must triple its power-generation capacity if it wants to electrify vehicles and other sectors of the economy. However, State officials said they were confident that the 12.5 million passenger cars and trucks hitting California roads by 2035 will not strain the grid.

Senate Democrats Release Budget Priorities Document in Preparation for May Budget Season, Highlighting Key Differences Between the Governor's and Legislature's Plans

On April 26, the Senate Democratic Caucus released its revised <u>budget priorities</u> document in preparation for the Governor's release of the May Revision of the Budget. Beginning in January of each year, the Governor releases a preliminary budget proposal, which kicks off the call-and-response process between the Administration and the Legislature on how best to spend taxpayer dollars. The budget process is in a unique position this year, with the extension of the tax filing deadline for individuals and businesses as a result of the severe winter storms. This extension will impact the delivery of returns data the Department of Finance will need to compile an accurate and comprehensive spending plan.

One of the fundamental differences between the Governor's and the Legislature's spending plans is whether or not to draw on reserve funds to mitigate issues associated with the anticipated deficit, which was projected to be close to \$22 billion in January. The Governor proposed spending cuts and deferrals to programs to protect the over \$37 billion in reserve funds, citing concerns with a looming recession and the need for cash on hand should the state experience an economic downturn. The Legislature, on the other hand, has proposed using reserve funds to keep key spending programs funded at current levels, which points to the name of their counter-budget proposal – "Protect our Progress."

However, other budget experts caution against the use of reserve funds. For instance, in Mid-April, the State's Legislative Analyst Gabe Petek released an <u>article</u> overviewing the State's anticipated fiscal condition, its causes, and the implications of drawing from reserve funds to offset revenue losses. Petek iterated that the revenue construction is not an outright downturn, but rather the other side of its recent revenue boom. The extraordinary General Fund revenue growth was allocated toward massive one-time and multi-year spending programs that are too high relative to revenue performance typical of historic norms.

Petek warned that recent turmoil in the banking sector, tech industry losses, and inflation and unemployment trends point to a looming recession that could send revenue estimates below baseline levels. To preserve mid-range financial security within the State, he favors the preservation of reserve funds and the cut and deferral of existing spending programs. While not the final decision maker on the matter, the Legislative Analyst's Office offers critical insight into the State's fiscal condition to be incorporated into spending practices. This insight could influence the State's final spending strategy.

Key spending priorities within the Senate Democrat's budget plan include the following:

- Rejects proposed cuts and delays to key infrastructure investments, such as broadband, transit, student housing, climate package investments, libraries, and more.
- Accelerates previously budgeted Transit Infrastructure funds and provides local flexibility to enable the funds to be used for operations as a bridge until a permanent operations fix can be established.
- Creates a \$10 billion Housing and Infrastructure Fund to fund one-time projects and programs that the Governor proposes to cut or delay. This includes Funding affordable housing, Transit infrastructure, Broadband, Clean energy, Student housing, School facilities, and more.
- Turns current one-time funding for the HHAP program into \$1 billion of ongoing funding to provide local governments.
- Provides \$4.3 billion in tax relief by slashing tax rates by 25 percent for small businesses, improving the Renters Tax Credit and CalEITC, and implementing the Workers Tax Fairness Tax Credit.

The Governor will release his May revision to the budget next month, which will guide ongoing negotiations between his Administration and the Legislature. However, due to the delay in tax return data, a comprehensive budget plan may not be fully realized until later this summer.

GENERAL MANAGER'S RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

Included in this report are recent activities of interest managed by the Public Affairs Office for the month of April 2023.

RELEVANT STANDARDS

- Maintain influential legislative advocacy and a public outreach program
- Build brand, trust, and support with policy makers and community leaders
- Maintain collaborative and cooperative relationships with regulators, stakeholders, and neighboring communities
- Listen to and seriously consider community input on environmental concerns

PROBLEM

The Orange County Sanitation District (OC San) is well-recognized within the water/wastewater industry; however, within our service area, as we do not have direct communications through a billing method, there may be limited knowledge by our customers of the important work we do to protect public health and the environment. In general, the customers we serve may not realize that when they improperly dispose of waste into the sanitation system, it can negatively affect our sewer lines, our treatment plants, and the quality of water we supply for the Groundwater Replenishment System.

PROPOSED SOLUTION

By providing tours, community outreach, education, and general communication via OC San's website, social media, and direct mailings, we can share information with the community, local agencies, and businesses on our messaging such as the What2Flush program, energy production, water recycling, biosolids, and OC San's source control program. This, in turn, helps improve the

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quality of wastewater that is recycled or released to the ocean and the knowledge and understanding of wastewater treatment.

RAMIFICATIONS OF NOT TAKING ACTION

If OC San does not inform the community, local agencies, and area businesses about OC San, we may not have the support necessary to deliver our mission.

Outreach Report

Media Coverage

During the month of April, OC San was mentioned in the Orange Coast Magazine, OC Register, and ABC 7 News for the Expansion of the GWRS. There were also articles on the new Supercritical Water Oxidation project in Yahoo Finance, the announcement of the new Director of Finance, and Congressman Correa presenting OC San with \$3 million for the PFAS contamination cleanup. Presentations

During the month of April, employees participated in eight tours and five speaking engagements including the Costa Mesa Earth Day, Villa Park City Council meeting, California Water Environment Association Conference, Cal State Long Beach Women's Conference, No Dig Show, and others. Construction Outreach

Outreach efforts continue for OC San construction activities throughout the service area. Projects are ongoing in Fountain Valley, Seal Beach, Westminster, Buena Park, Anaheim, and within both of the treatment plants. Website updates, email text alerts, and direct notifications continue to be distributed as the projects progress. In April, over 4,500 notifications were distributed in Seal Beach, Los Alamitos, Rossmoor, Fountain Valley, and Anaheim.

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OC San Video Contest

OC San launched its 2023 Video Contest offering high school and college students who live or attend school within OC San's service area an opportunity to create an educational video. This year's theme is "Find Yourself at OC San" and is intended to highlight careers in wastewater. The winning videos will be showcased on our social media platforms and our website. Video submittals are due May 19. Details can be found on OC San's website.

Neighborhood Connection Newsletter

The spring issue of OC San's community newsletter was distributed in April. The issue includes updates on infrastructure projects throughout the service area and both plants, Supercritical Water Oxidation project and an introduction to OC San's Community Liaisons. The newsletter is distributed electronically to approximately 4,500 readers and shared on OC San's social media platforms.

GWRS Final Expansion Event

OC San and the Orange County Water District hosted a dedication event for the final completion of the GWRS on April 14. Over 350 dignitaries attended the event which received news coverage from various outlets.

Wastewater 101 Citizens Academy

The last two workshops of the spring Citizens Academy took place in April, culminating in a tour of the plant and a graduation at the April Board meeting. This session had a record number of graduates with 30 attendees receiving completion certificates.

Internal Communication

Internal communication is a key component of the Public Affairs Office. In April, there were 45 posts on the employee intranet - *The San Box*, four weekly emails distributed on hot topics for the week, and the employee newsletter, *The Pipeline*, was also published.

Awards

OC San won first place for the California Water Environmental Association Community Engagement and Outreach: Project of the Year - Large for OC San's partnership with the Heritage Museum. This partnership allows OC San to deliver messaging on What 2 Flush to 4,500 visitors of the museum thus expanding our reach. Staff accepted the award at the annual conference in April.

The Honor Walk Recognition Program nominations for former employees were approved by the Executive Management Team and are agendized for the Steering Committee. The Honor Walk celebration will be held on Wednesday, June 28 at 4 p.m. at OC San's Plant No. 1.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

In 2008, the Steering Committee adopted a Resolution that provided a framework for recognizing past Board members and former staff for their outstanding contributions. One of the results of this resolution and the discussions that followed was the creation of the Honor Walk in front of the Administration Building at Plant No. 1 in 2009 with the first honoree recognized in 2010.

Honorees can be past Board members or employees who made significant contributions to Orange County Sanitation District (OC San) and the people it serves.

The policy and procedures developed by the Steering Committee stipulate that the General Manager make a recommendation to the Steering Committee for approval of the retired staff nominees; and the Steering Committee will deliberate and decide on past Board members.

The criteria adopted by the Board of Directors for selecting an Honor Walk recipient:

- Have a long-standing affiliation with OC San.

Marc Dubois made a significant contribution to the District over his nearly 25 years as the Contracts, Purchasing, and Materials Manager. He developed Purchasing ordinances, policies, and procedures that govern the way the District does business to this day. Having previously worked at LA County Sanitation and the County of Orange, he came to the District in 1995 with experience that he used to create an effective, progressive, and highly regarded procurement department.

Throughout his career, Marc, with his leadership and collaborative skills with other managers, streamlined the procurement process in several significant ways, such as:

- Instituting electronic bidding aligning with the District's paperless initiative and expediting the formal procurement process.
- Helping to create the District standard in Board Agenda Reports that allowed for the establishment of contingency funds for projects at time of award.
- Creating the District's first-ever Maintenance and Repair Master contract, which allowed the
 District to complete a backlog of projects quickly and efficiently and still allows for the fast
 procurement of numerous maintenance and repair projects.

Orange County Sanitation District Honor Walk Nominee

My name is Thomas Blanda a former employee with Orange County Sanitation District.

I would like to nominate a retired employee, Jack Ellis from the Collection Division to be considered for the Honor Walk.

To gather some history about the retired employees Jack Ellis, I contacted Gary Marsalek and Larry Rood (former employees) who worked with him in the past as I did.

Jack Ellis was a pioneer in our industry and the cornerstone of the Collection Division and the District. There are only a few names of past retired employees of the District that symbolize the hard work that brought the District to where they are today and no better example is this gentlemen.

The dedication he had for his job and realizing the responsibilities he had to the public and the environment was his trademark before it became fashionable. The willingness to do a good job and to pass on his knowledge is only some of many traits that he shown during his employment.

He helped manage a large sewer system that was forever changing in size and responsibilities including 35 lift stations.

With new technology across the industry coming out were some of the challenges he faced with the pump stations and line maintenance.

His leadership and management skills for that time were strong and yet compassionate earning respect from employees from across the departments for being fair and understanding. He was always supportive of staff in education and employment advancement in the organization or the industry.

Information below is gathered from myself, Gary Marsalek, Larry Rood, and the District's archives. The events that took place during his watch were many with only a few listed, each having lessons learned that helped establish a standard of operations being used today.

Some notable Events and Responsibilities of the Division during his watch

Airplane crash at Westside PS, Sealbeach Force main break(s), PCH Force main break(s)

Inheriting pump stations and sewer lines from other cities to manage and maintain with little or No drawings.

Sewer lines and sewer interceptors running through farm land and oil fields.

House lateral maintenance in some areas through-out the district

Pump stations 35 total with a lot of submersible PS / all pump station shut downs, cleaning, and by-passes done by staff.

Inter-divisional assistance for both Plants 1&2

Easement maintenance for access and cleaning

Notable Standards

Started Preventive Maintenance Program for Pump Stations / valve exercising (stations and force mains) established a trouble spot and siphon cleaning program for the Line Maintenance side

Invented the (PVC) plastic / rubber face gas flap

Established stand-by duties

Encouraged staff to obtain certification from CWPCA (CWEA)

Contributed Questions for the CWPCA Collection grade tests when it first started.

Tools / Equipment available during that time

Small rodder, Med rodder trailer mounted (no Hydro Flusher until mid 70's)

Pump Station maintenance Rig / three pull rigs and trailer rigs.

Walkie talkies for line cleaners (no two way radios until later) pay telephones or visits to the field

A lot of the equipment used in the pump stations and line cleaning were from the Oil fields and War surplus / piping, valves, tools, cable rigs

Thomas Brothers Maps with colored outlines for identifying jurisdiction

Very little safety equipment compared to today standards and no record of a fatality todate in the Collection Division.

Telemetry for pump stations very limited

<u>Jack Ellis (Shop Foremen) (if now Sr. Supervisor) 1957 - 1979</u>

Jack's Grand-Father's farmland is what the District's Plant 1 is sitting on and the street was named after the Ellis family.

Before starting at the District, Marshall visited Jack many times on the farm to discuss and or fabricate items, for the District.

After a few years in college he started working at the district 1957

A master of fabrication, heavy equipment operator and problem solver

Built the old maintenance shops at Pl.1 (the two rolls of wood buildings—used Digester gas to heat the shops

Managed numerous force main breaks and by-passes on PCH, Seal Beach, and a airplane crash at Westside PS. Almost all the work was done by in- house staff that maintained, repaired, and replaced equipment.

Annual Collection's budgets were hand written on yellow legal paper and then sent to be typed

Designed, layout, and installed pumps at the District Pump Stations

Always took the time to explain the job or answer questions and carried a piece of soap stone in his pocket to work problems out or describe the task on the black top.

Jack Ellis was presented with a 15 Year Districts' Service Award, March 8, 1972.

In Closing

Jack left the District in a whisper when he retired with only the memories of his accomplishments left for others. He was able to do so much with so little to make the District what it is today. It's only suitable for the District to put his name in a place of honor for his achievements and dedication to the District, the environment, and the public.

The value of water independence

Twenty years ago, the elected officials who served on the boards of the Orange County Sanitation District and Orange County Water District had a visionary idea to recycle treated wastewater to drinking water standards and percolate that water into our underground aquifer where it could eventually be used again for drinking water.

The project — which would be known as the Groundwater Replenishment System — was not without opposition, much of it surrounding the cost of the project and the water it would produce. I served on the OCSD board at the time in my position as a council member in the city of Orange and I took my position of fiscal responsibility seriously. Being fiscally responsible means forecasting not just the value of the project in today's dollars, but the value of building infrastructure for future generations.

Admittedly, when GWRS came online in 2008, the cost of the water it produced was more expensive than the alternative of buying imported water from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California. However, as imported water continued to increase in cost over the past decade, the GWRS water became less expensive and we now have local reliability at a lower cost.

Today, Orange County is considering the same investment with seawater desalination, and there is a value to building a project that will provide drought-proof, reliable, high-quality drinking water.

In Carlsbad, Poseidon Water built a 50 million gallon per day seawater desalination plant for \$1 billion in private financing. The Carlsbad Desalination Plant has produced and

delivered over 20 billion gallons of drinking water since December 2015 at a cost of approximately \$.007 (just over half-a-penny) per gallon. The public-private partnership project delivery method allowed for the San Diego County Water Authority to develop new, capital-intensive public-serving infrastructure without incurring debt or negatively affecting bond ratings. Successful delivery of the project without significant impact to water rates or debt burden was a factor that led to improvement in the San Diego County Water Authority's credit rating. On the flip side, because the price of desalinated water was determined prior to construction of the plant, public water agency customers have a greater certainty in projecting long-term water rates. In contrast, since 1978, the cost of water imported into Southern California by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California has escalated annually by average of 6.4 percent.

The San Diego ratepayers only pay for that water if it is produced at the quality and quantity specified in Poseidon's contract with the San Diego County Water Authority. While it is slightly more expensive than imported water today, by 2025 — after 10 years of operation — that water is expected to be less expensive than treated imported water.

In addition to providing an affordable new local water supply, the project would create more than 300 on-site jobs over its three-year construction process and nearly 10 times that amount in indirect jobs. The project would also provide tens of millions of dollars in tax revenue to the city of Huntington Beach and the county of Orange. At a time when companies are fleeing California, we need to embrace companies willing to invest in quality infrastructure projects that benefit us all.

As the CEO and president of the Orange County Taxpayers Association, I will be looking closely at the final water purchase agreement between Poseidon Water and the Orange County Water District to ensure the protection of the ratepayers. But — as with GWRS — it is critical to understand the difference between cost and value. And there is a significant value to Orange County becoming more water independent and less susceptible to California's "boom and bust" climate that is prone to long-term droughts.

Jim was instrumental in the creation and commission of the Groundwater Replenishment System, helped the OC San move to secondary treatment, led the Board to adoption of a resolution to accept Urban Runoff; helped the OC San transfer 176 miles of local sewer pipes in unincorporated areas of Orange County to the East Orange County Water District and so much more.

These are a few examples of how his extreme dedication, leadership, guidance, and commitment to this agency have led us to where we are today.

BACKGROUND

The Orange County Sanitation District's (OC San) recently adopted Ordinance No. OC SAN-58, a new five-year sewer fee rate schedule which provides for equitable and proportionate distribution for the cost of service of operating OC San's wastewater system. In December 2022, HDR Engineering, Inc. issued its "Final Wastewater Rates, Fees, and Charges Study" ("HDR Report"). OC San's Board of Directors received the HDR Report on December 15, 2022. The report includes a section on Exemptions, Rebates, Refunds and Reduced Charges. During staff preparation for rebate notifications, a clerical error was discovered in the report table for a reduced charge. This table was included in the adopted Ordinance No. OC SAN-58 and needs to be corrected.

Section 2.03. Exemptions, Rebates, Refunds and Reduced Charges

A. <u>Exemptions</u>. It is the intent of OC San that the legal owner(s) of parcels of real property, otherwise subject to the levy and payment of the Sewer Service Charges, as prescribed herein, be relieved, in whole or in part, from the payment of said charges, in certain circumstances and under conditions prescribed herein, and be entitled to either a low-water rebate, reduced charge, or a refund with respect to charges paid, as more specifically set forth in Subparagraphs 2.03B and 2.03C below, provided an inequity is established or a billing error is proven, as specified in Subparagraphs 2.03B or 2.03C.

B. Application for Low-Water or Reduced Charge.

(1) A "low-water rebate" is based on the ratio of the annual flow to the assumed discharge for a parcel.

ORDINANCE NO. OC SAN-58

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF ORANGE COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT ADOPTING REGIONAL SEWER SERVICE CHARGES AND REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. OCSD-49

WHEREAS, Health & Safety Code Section 5471 authorizes the Orange County Sanitation District's ("OC San") Board of Directors to impose fees and other charges for services and facilities furnished by OC San in connection with OC San's sewage collection, treatment, disposal, and reuse system; and

WHEREAS, OC San imposes annual sewer service charges on residential and commercial users. OC San uses revenue from these charges to operate, maintain, replace, and improve OC San's existing facilities. The current service charges are set forth in Ordinance No. OCSD-49:

WHEREAS, OC San recently retained HDR Engineering, Inc. to evaluate OC San's projected revenue needs and recommend rates for the five-year period of July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2028-. In December of 2022, HDR Engineering, Inc. issued its "Final Wastewater Rates, Fees, and Charges Study" ("HDR Report") OC San's Board of Directors received the HDR Report on December 15, 2022, and the HDR Report is on file with OC San; and

WHEREAS, the recommendations set forth in the HDR Report are based in part on OC San's 2017 Facilities Master Plan ("Master Plan"). The Master Plan identified the capital improvement projects that will be needed over the next 20 years, and estimated the cost of each project. OC San's Board of Directors approved the Master Plan on December 20, 2017; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article XIIID, section 6, of the California Constitution, OC San mailed notice of a public hearing on the proposed sewer service charges to the record owner of each parcel subject to the proposed charges. The notice, which set forth the date, time, and location of the public hearing, as well as the charges, fees, and rates proposed for imposition, was mailed no less than 45 days prior to the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Health and Safety Code sections 4766 and 5473, the Board of Directors may elect to have the proposed regional sewer service charges collected on the tax roll in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with and not separately from, its general taxes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 5473.1, on March 8, 2023, notice of a public hearing regarding the proposed sewer service charges and the election to have such charges collected on the tax roll was published in the Orange County Register, a newspaper of general circulation within OC San published in the county where OC San is located. The notice set forth the date, time and location of the hearing; and

WHEREAS, on Wednesday, March 22, 2023 at 6:00 P.M., in OC San's Boardroom on the first floor of its Administration Building located at 10844 Ellis Avenue, Fountain Valley, California, OC San held a properly noticed public hearing in order to receive and

consider comments, including objections, concerning the proposed regional sewer service charges and the election to have such charges collected on the tax roll; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors has carefully reviewed the HDR Report and considered oral and written comments from the public, Board Members, OC San staff, and OC San consultants made at and prior to the March 22, 2023 public hearing;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of the Orange County Sanitation District does hereby ORDAIN:

SECTION I. Adopt Regional Sewer Service Charges

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ARTICLE II: <u>SEWER SERVICE CHARGES</u>

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Reduced Charges

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B. Application for Water Efficiency Rebate/

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ARTICLE I

FINDINGS

Section 1.01. Findings. Based upon substantial evidence presented to the Board of Directors, the Board of Directors of District hereby finds that:

- A. The revenues collected pursuant to this Ordinance shall be used to finance the improvements, programs, and staffing needed to operate, maintain, replace, and improve OC San's existing facilities, fund necessary reserves, and retire debt incurred to finance such activities. The revenues shall be used for no other purpose.
- B. The revenues collected pursuant to this Ordinance are reasonably related to, and will not exceed, the cost of the improvements, programs, and staffing needed to operate, maintain, replace, and improve OC San's existing facilities, fund necessary reserves, and retire debt incurred to finance such activities over a reasonable period of time.
- C. The amount charged to each parcel pursuant to this Ordinance does not exceed the proportional cost of the service attributable to the parcel.
- D. The financial requirements of OC San as reflected in the Master Plan and other documents, are based on current, reliable information, and further, that data relating to population projections, wastewater flow, and capital facility needs are expected to be realized in each year as described in the reports.
- E. The successful operation, maintenance, replacement, and improvement of OC San's existing facilities is necessary to protect public health, safety, and the environment.
- F. The Sewer Service Charges adopted herein will not result in an expansion of facilities to accommodate growth within or outside the existing service area. The adoption of these Sewer Service Charges will not result in any specific project, nor result in a direct physical change in the environment.
- G. This Ordinance is statutorily exempt from review under the California Environmental Quality Act pursuant to Section 21080(b)(8) of the Public Resources Code, because the Sewer Service Charges will be used (i) for operating expenses, (ii) for the purchase or lease of supplies, equipment, or materials, (iii) to meet financial reserve needs and requirements, and (iv) to obtain funds for capital projects necessary to maintain service within existing service areas.
- H. That all fees and charges established herein have been approved by OC San's Board of Directors at a noticed public meeting, all in accordance with applicable provisions of law.

ARTICLE II

SEWER SERVICE CHARGES

Section 2.01. Purpose and Scope. The purpose of this Ordinance is to establish Sewer Service Charges to be paid by property owners for the services and facilities furnished by OC San. The revenues collected pursuant to this Ordinance shall be used to finance the improvements, programs, and staffing needed to operate, maintain, replace, and improve OC San's existing facilities, fund necessary reserves, and retire debt incurred to finance such activities.

Section 2.02. Annual Sewer Service Charge.

Commencing with the effective date of this Ordinance, the owner of each parcel of real property located within OC San's service area which is improved with structures designed for residential, commercial, or industrial use and which, at the request of the owner or the owner's predecessor-in-interest, is connected to OC San's sewerage system, shall pay an annual Sewer Service Charge based on the respective class of users, in the sum or sums, as set forth in Tables A and B of this Ordinance, below, and incorporated by reference herein. The annual Sewer Service Charges for residential users are set forth in Table A. The applicable single family residential rate shown in Table A is multiplied by the applicable percentage figure shown on Table B with respect to the particular use classification to arrive at the annual Sewer Service Charge rate per 1,000 square feet or per unit. The annual Sewer Service Charges are dependent upon the respective classifications of property use, determined by reference to Table B.

Section 2.03. Exemptions, Rebates, Refunds and Reduced Charges

A. <u>Exemptions</u>. It is the intent of OC San that the legal owner(s) of parcels of real property, otherwise subject to the levy and payment of the Sewer Service Charges, as prescribed herein, be relieved, in whole or in part, from the payment of said charges, in certain circumstances and under conditions prescribed herein, and be entitled to either a low-water rebate, reduced charge, or a refund with respect to charges paid, as more specifically set forth in Subparagraphs 2.03B and 2.03C below, provided an inequity is established or a billing error is proven, as specified in Subparagraphs 2.03B or 2.03C.

B. <u>Application for Low-Water or Reduced Charge</u>.

(1) A <u>"low-water rebate"</u> is based on the ratio of the annual flow to the assumed discharge for a parcel.

Customer's Annual Flow Divided by Assumed Flow	Customer Percent Reduction
90% or Greater	0%
70% to 89%	20%
50% to 69%	40%
30% to 39%	60%
29% or Less	80%

- (2) A <u>"reduced charge"</u> is a lower sewer service charge imposed for the current fiscal year or a future fiscal year based on water consumption as provided herein.
- (3) Any property owner, or legally recognized authorized representative of the property owner, may apply to OC San for a low-water rebate or reduced charge by establishing that an inequity exists between the amount of the charge paid and the amount of wastewater discharged to OC San's system. Proof satisfactory to the General Manager of OC San, or his/her designee, shall establish that either:
 - (a) The principal water use is agricultural or horticultural; or
 - (b) The property is devoted to any other use wherein the amount of wastewater discharged to OC San's system is significantly less on a regular basis than the amount that would normally be expected to be discharged by the class of property in question.
- (4) Satisfactory proof shall include, but not be limited to, verifiable documentation showing actual water usage for each billing cycle during the entire period for which the rebate is sought.
- (5) The amount of any low-water rebate shall not reduce the charge payable by any property owner, whose property is connected to OC San's system, to less than the single family residential charge shown on the applicable Table attached hereto.
- (5) Once a low-water rebate or reduced charge to a service charge is granted, additional rebates or reduced charges will not be granted in the same year unless the property was vacant for the entire year.

C. <u>Application for Refund.</u>

- (1) A "refund" is the difference between the original service charge paid by a property owner and the corrected service charge when the original charge was billed erroneously.
- (2) Any property owner, or legally recognized authorized representative of the property owner, may apply to OC San for a refund of Sewer Service Charges paid to OC San by establishing that the amount paid was pursuant to an error in the amount billed or the amount paid. The applicant for a refund must submit proof satisfactory to the General Manager of OC San, or his/her designee, that a billing error has been

made by OC San, or the County Tax Collector. Such proof shall include, but not be limited to, proof that:

- (a) The owner's parcel of property is not connected to OC San's system; or
- (b) The property has not been classified in the proper property use classification code; or
- (c) A clerical error has been made.

D. Limitations Period.

- (1) Applications for low-water rebates and reduced charges shall be deemed a claim and be governed by the provisions of California Government Code Sections 935 et seq. Low-water rebates are only available for the most recently ended fiscal year and shall be presented to OC San as provided in the Government Tort Claims Act, Government Code Sections 915 et seq., Reduced charge claims are available for the current fiscal year or future fiscal years. The claim for low-water rebate or reduced charge may only be made with respect to amounts paid or payable under such property tax bill. A claim for low-water rebate or reduced charge is not deemed a claim for refund, and California Revenue & Taxation Code Sections 5096 and 5097 are not applicable.
- (2) Applications for refunds shall be deemed to be governed by the provisions of California Revenue & Taxation Code Sections 5096 and 5097.
- (3) Consistent with Section 2.04, a "year" for purposes of this Section 2.03 commences on July 1 for all annual Sewer Service Charges, based on OC San's fiscal year.
- E. <u>Determination</u>. All applications for low-water rebates, reduced charges or refunds of the Sewer Service Charge will be determined by the General Manager of OC San, or his/her designee, who, based on the submitted proof, may grant a full or partial rebate, reduced charge or refund.
- F. <u>Administrative Fee</u>. At the time of filing the application for a low-water rebate, reduced charge or refund, the property owner shall pay OC San an administrative fee for the processing of such application. The amount of the fee shall be equal to the total of all fees and charges imposed on OC San by any other public entity, such as the Orange County Tax Collector, the Orange County Auditor, or the Orange County Recorder, in connection with the rebate or refund.
- G. <u>Duration of Reduced Charge.</u> A reduced charge will remain in effect for one fiscal year, subject to the provisions below:

- (1) Standard 5- Year Lock-In. Upon submission of three consecutive fiscal years of verifiable water data that resulted in a rebate or reduced charge, OC San shall determine the average annual percentage reduction based upon those three years. If qualified, OC San will implement a locked-in reduced charge for a standard period of five years.
- (2) Renewals. At the end of the lock-in period, the owner of the parcel may apply for a renewal by submitting verifiable water consumption data for the previous three years.
- (3) <u>Failure to Submit.</u> Failure to submit the required water consumption data with lock-in renewal application is equivalent to making an election to opt-out pursuant to Section 2.03, Article II, G4.
- (4) Lock-In Opt-Out. At the time the owner of a parcel qualifies for a five-year lock-in pursuant to Section 2.03, Article II, G1, whether as a first time application for rebate or reduced charge, as a renewal pursuant to Section 2.03, Article II, G2, or upon three annual submittals of the most recent fiscal year of verifiable water consumption records, the owner may elect in writing to opt-out of the lock-in and instead elect year to year renewals and submit verifiable water consumption records annually.
- (5) Significant Change in Business Operation-Demonstration. If the owner of a locked-in parcel is able to demonstrate that a significant change in business operation has occurred, verifiable water consumption may be submitted for the most recently ended fiscal year to be used in a recalculation of the reduction with a duration of one year until three consecutive fiscal years of water consumption have been submitted and then the standard lock-in will apply.
- (6) Audit. If OC San becomes aware that a lock-in parcel has had a significant change in business operation that increases water consumption, OC San may request current verifiable water consumption records for the most recently ended fiscal year and re-establish the reduced charge prior to the expiration of the five-year period.
- H. <u>Penalty.</u> The falsification of an application for a low-water rebate or reduced charge is a misdemeanor, punishable as provided by the law. In addition, any person who falsifies an application for a water efficiency rebate or reduced charge shall be civilly liable to OC San in the maximum sum provided by law.

Section 2.04. Annual Charge Based on Fiscal Year. The Sewer Service Charges established by this Ordinance shall be effective as of July 1 of each year, as set forth in Tables A and B, attached hereto, for OC San's fiscal year, and shall remain in effect until such time as the rates adopted herein are changed by OC San Ordinance. There shall be no proration of such charges in any fiscal year.

Section 2.05. Method of Collection.

- A. Pursuant to the authority granted by California Health & Safety Code Sections 4766 and 5473, and except as otherwise provided in Subparagraph 2.05B below, all Sewer Service Charges established herein shall be collected on the County Tax Roll in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with, and not separately from, its general taxes. The County Treasurer-Tax Collector is authorized and hereby ordered to make said collections in accordance with the terms and conditions of agreements between the County of Orange and OC San.
- B. In the event OC San determines that, due to billing or payment error, or to inequity in the amount billed, a property owner (or person who paid the tax) has underpaid annual Sewer Service Charges payable to OC San, OC San, within four (4) years after the date of mailing of the tax bill, may:
 - (1) collect the amount of any deficiency directly on the County Tax Roll;
 - (2) off-set the amount of any deficiency against any amounts that OC San determines is owing, by OC San, to the property owner, as a rebate or refund under this Ordinance; or
 - (3) submit, directly to the property owner, a bill for the amount of any deficiency, which shall be due and payable within thirty (30) days of the invoice date and which, if not paid, shall become a lien on said property.
- Section 2.06. <u>Credit for Industrial Permittees</u>. A credit shall be allowed to all dischargers permitted pursuant to Article 3 of District Ordinance No. OCSD-53, as amended, in an amount equal to the annual Sewer Service Charge established by Section 2.02 of this Ordinance.
- Section 2.07. Open-Air Facilities. Sewer Service Charges for openair facilities will be based on annual attendance records. Open-Air facilities will pay a rate per million gallons based upon the related sewage flow, Biochemical Oxygen Demand ("BOD") and Suspended Solids ("SS") charge for single family residences. The usage per attendee will be 15 gallons.

ARTICLE III

MISCELLANEOUS

Section 3.01. Application of Ordinance. The provisions of this Ordinance shall be in addition to (i) the provisions of OC San's Wastewater Discharge Regulations for use of District's sewage facilities, including provisions for payment of charges or fees related thereto; (ii) District's ordinance establishing Fees Concerning Annexations of Territory to OC San; (iii) District's ordinance establishing Local Sewer Service Fees, where applicable, and (iii) any other District Ordinances and Resolutions not in conflict herewith.

<u>Section 3.02</u>. <u>Exceptions</u>. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to all owners of properties within OC San, including those properties otherwise deemed exempt from payment of taxes or assessments by provisions of the State Constitution or statute, including properties owned by other public agencies or tax-exempt organizations, except as expressly provided herein.

Section 3.03. Out of Area Sewer Service Agreements. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code Section 4742.1, OC San is empowered to contract for the handling, treatment or disposal by OC San of sewage or industrial wastes originating within OC San or county or within areas outside of OC San or county when, in the judgment of OC San Board, it is for the best interest of OC San to do so. In exercise of such power, OC San may, from time to time, enter into Out-of-Area Sewer Service Agreements. These Out-of-Area Sewer Service Agreements will establish fees and charges relative to the services provided by OC San for each individual agreement.

The Board of Directors of the Orange County Sanitation District does further hereby ORDAIN:

<u>SECTION II.</u> <u>Severability.</u> If any provision of this Ordinance, or the application to any person or circumstances is held invalid by order of Court, the remainder of the Ordinance, or the application of such provision to other persons or other circumstances, shall not be affected.

<u>SECTION III</u>. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Ordinance shall take effect July 1, 2023.

<u>SECTION IV.</u> Repeal. Ordinance No. OCSD-49 is repealed in its entirety effective June 30, 2023.

<u>SECTION V.</u> Certification and Publication. The Clerk of the Board shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause a summary to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within 15 days as required by law.

BACKGROUND

Orange County Sanitation District (OC San) is constructing a new headquarters building under Project No. P1-128A. The new headquarters will require furniture, fixtures, and equipment (FFE) that were intentionally not included in the primary construction contract and were planned as a separate, coordinated effort. The FFE includes items such as desks, chairs, and cabinets. The P1-128A design consultant, HDR Engineering, has assisted in the FFE design to ensure the items selected are compatible with the building design, create a cohesive aesthetic with the mass timber building, support the collaborative work environment OC San is trying to create, and meet quality standards for a long service life.

PROBLEM

The new headquarters building requires FFE to be functional. Staff will not be able to use the new building if FFE is not purchased.

PROPOSED SOLUTION

Approve a purchase order contract for FFE for Headquarters Complex at Plant No. 1, Project No. P1-128A.

TIMING CONCERNS

The FFE must be installed by December 2023 to maintain the project schedule and allow staff to occupy the new building.

RAMIFICATIONS OF NOT TAKING ACTION

The FFE must be installed by December 2023 to maintain the project schedule and allow staff to occupy the new building.

PRIOR COMMITTEE/BOARD ACTIONS

April 2023 - Approved a Purchase Order Contract to GM Business Interiors (GMBI) for the purchase of furniture, fixtures, and equipment for the Headquarters Complex at Plant No. 1, Project No. P1-128A, utilizing the County of Orange Regional Cooperative Agreement No. RCA-017-22010154 for a total amount not to exceed \$3,907,183 including freight and sales tax; and approved a contingency of \$39,072 (1%).

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

OC San requested proposals on December 28, 2022 from three different furniture dealers that currently have active cooperative agreements that OC San can utilize for this purchase in accordance with OC San's Purchasing Ordinance. All proposals were reviewed and evaluated and GMBI provided the most competitively priced proposal. OC San approved a Purchase Order Contract to GMBI under the County of Orange Regional Cooperative Agreement Number RCA-017-22010154 at the April 26, 2023 Board meeting.

After executing the contract, GMBI discovered a significant error in their pricing and was unable to stand by their proposal. OC San elected to re-open negotiations with all three dealers to provide their best and final pricing as well as cost-saving alternatives. PeopleSpace Inc. provided a high-quality and cost-competitive package with the most opportunity for cost savings. The revised proposal from PeopleSpace Inc. was \$4,995,819 based on the specified furniture. PeopleSpace Inc.'s cost saving proposal offers the possibility to reduce the cost to \$3.4 million with significant design changes involving color, finish, functionality, and workplace environment impacts. The amount listed in this Recommendation is the total without any cost savings factored in. The design team will coordinate with PeopleSpace Inc. to reduce the cost as much as possible without significantly reducing quality of the product or working environment.

The Cooperative Agreements being used were awarded using a competitive bid process comparable to OC San's and vetted by OC San's Purchasing Division. These costs are inclusive of freight and sales tax.







ORANGE COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT GLOSSARY OF TERMS

ACTIVATED SLUDGE PROCESS – A secondary biological wastewater treatment process where bacteria reproduce at a high rate with the introduction of excess air or oxygen and consume dissolved nutrients in the wastewater.

BENTHOS – The community of organisms, such as sea stars, worms, and shrimp, which live on, in, or near the seabed, also known as the benthic zone.

BIOCHEMICAL OXYGEN DEMAND (BOD) – The amount of oxygen used when organic matter undergoes decomposition by microorganisms. Testing for BOD is done to assess the amount of organic matter in water.

BIOGAS – A gas that is produced by the action of anaerobic bacteria on organic waste matter in a digester tank that can be used as a fuel.

BIOSOLIDS – Biosolids are nutrient rich organic and highly treated solid materials produced by the wastewater treatment process. This high-quality product can be recycled as a soil amendment on farmland or further processed as an earth-like product for commercial and home gardens to improve and maintain fertile soil and stimulate plant growth.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (CIP) – Projects for repair, rehabilitation, and replacement of assets. Also includes treatment improvements, additional capacity, and projects for the support facilities.

COLIFORM BACTERIA – A group of bacteria found in the intestines of humans and other animals, but also occasionally found elsewhere, used as indicators of sewage pollution. E. coli are the most common bacteria in wastewater.

COLLECTIONS SYSTEM – In wastewater, it is the system of typically underground pipes that receive and convey sanitary wastewater or storm water.

CERTIFICATE OF PARTICIPATION (COP) – A type of financing where an investor purchases a share of the lease revenues of a program rather than the bond being secured by those revenues.

CONTAMINANTS OF POTENTIAL CONCERN (CPC) – Pharmaceuticals, hormones, and other organic wastewater contaminants.

DILUTION TO THRESHOLD (D/T) – The dilution at which the majority of people detect the odor becomes the D/T for that air sample.

GREENHOUSE GASES (GHG) – In the order of relative abundance water vapor, carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide, and ozone gases that are considered the cause of global warming ("greenhouse effect").

GROUNDWATER REPLENISHMENT SYSTEM (GWRS) – A joint water reclamation project that proactively responds to Southern California's current and future water needs. This joint project between the Orange County Water District and OCSD provides 70 million gallons per day of drinking quality water to replenish the local groundwater supply.

LEVEL OF SERVICE (LOS) - Goals to support environmental and public expectations for performance.

N-NITROSODIMETHYLAMINE (NDMA) – A N-nitrosamine suspected cancer-causing agent. It has been found in the GWRS process and is eliminated using hydrogen peroxide with extra ultra-violet treatment.

NATIONAL BIOSOLIDS PARTNERSHIP (NBP) – An alliance of the NACWA and WEF, with advisory support from the EPA. NBP is committed to developing and advancing environmentally sound and sustainable biosolids management practices that go beyond regulatory compliance and promote public participation to enhance the credibility of local agency biosolids programs and improved communications that lead to public acceptance.

PER- AND POLYFLUOROALKYL SUBSTANCES (PFAS) – A large group (over 6,000) of human-made compounds that are resistant to heat, water, and oil and used for a variety of applications including firefighting foam, stain and water-resistant clothing, cosmetics, and food packaging. Two PFAS compounds, perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) and perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) have been the focus of increasing regulatory scrutiny in drinking water and may result in adverse health effects including developmental effects to fetuses during pregnancy, cancer, liver damage, immunosuppression, thyroid effects, and other effects.

PERFLUOROOCTANOIC ACID (PFOA) – An ingredient for several industrial applications including carpeting, upholstery, apparel, floor wax, textiles, sealants, food packaging, and cookware (Teflon).

PERFLUOROOCTANESULFONIC ACID (PFOS) – A key ingredient in Scotchgard, a fabric protector made by 3M, and used in numerous stain repellents.

PLUME – A visible or measurable concentration of discharge from a stationary source or fixed facility.

PUBLICLY OWNED TREATMENT WORKS (POTW) - A municipal wastewater treatment plant.

SANTA ANA RIVER INTERCEPTOR (SARI) LINE – A regional brine line designed to convey 30 million gallons per day of non-reclaimable wastewater from the upper Santa Ana River basin to the ocean for disposal, after treatment.

SANITARY SEWER - Separate sewer systems specifically for the carrying of domestic and industrial wastewater.

SOUTH COAST AIR QUALITY MANAGEMENT DISTRICT (SCAQMD) – Regional regulatory agency that develops plans and regulations designed to achieve public health standards by reducing emissions from business and industry.

SECONDARY TREATMENT – Biological wastewater treatment, particularly the activated sludge process, where bacteria and other microorganisms consume dissolved nutrients in wastewater.

SLUDGE – Untreated solid material created by the treatment of wastewater.

TOTAL SUSPENDED SOLIDS (TSS) - The amount of solids floating and in suspension in wastewater.

ORANGE COUNTY SANITATION DISTRICT GLOSSARY OF TERMS

TRICKLING FILTER – A biological secondary treatment process in which bacteria and other microorganisms, growing as slime on the surface of rocks or plastic media, consume nutrients in wastewater as it trickles over them.

URBAN RUNOFF – Water from city streets and domestic properties that carry pollutants into the storm drains, rivers, lakes, and oceans.

WASTEWATER – Any water that enters the sanitary sewer.

WATERSHED – A land area from which water drains to a particular water body. OCSD's service area is in the Santa Ana River Watershed.
